Course Catalogue: Study of the basic skills of good reasoning needed for the intelligent and responsible conduct of life. Topics include: argument structure and identification, validity and strength of arguments, common fallacies of reasoning, use and abuse of language in reasoning, principles of fair play in argumentation.

General Education Requirements

This course meets the university's GE requirements for Area A-3, Critical Thinking (https://www.csus.edu/umanual/acad/fsg00020.htm).

In academic courses, students commonly engage in critical thinking. In courses meeting the criteria for inclusion in the Critical Thinking category, students not only engage in, but study about and consciously develop skill in critical thinking. Courses in this category shall be devoted to the pursuit of knowledge through logical analysis and the construction of argument. Instruction shall develop an understanding of logical relationships between premises and conclusion, and the ability to recognize the more common formal and informal fallacies. Throughout such courses, attention to logical processes and skills shall exceed attention, if any, to other content. Grading shall reflect this emphasis. The courses shall foster basic skills, applicable to a variety of academic subjects and to the intelligent fulfillment of such roles as citizen, consumer, leader, and moral agent. Such courses shall develop the following:

- 1. skill in evaluating the validity, strength, and relevance of arguments;
- 2. a sense of logical structure, of both inductive and deductive forms;
- 3. an awareness of uses and abuses of argument language, including connotation, ambiguity, and definition;
- 4. skill at handling a variety of arguments in a variety of contexts;
- 5. ability to argue fairly and to handle bias, emotion, and propaganda.

- Identify and apply the elements of sound logical reasoning to compose and critique deductive and inductive arguments.
- Identify and critique fallacies, biases, and errors in reasoning.

- Identify and evaluate the use of facts and opinions as evidence in the construction of arguments.
- Identify and evaluate methods and reasoning appropriate to the discipline associated with the course.

- 1. Describe, explain and distinguish key concepts in critical thinking.
- 2. Identify an argument in a passage of ordinary text, including identifying the premises and conclusions and distinguishing them from extraneous information.
- 3. Identify errors of reasoning and explain what the error in reasoning is.
- 4. Engage with peers in cogent and respectful discussion.
- 5. Analyze specific arguments for consistency and credibility.
- 6. Apply good reasoning to issues and problems in professional and personal contexts.
- 7. Evaluate evidence and draw inferences from that evidence.
- 8. Determine what evidence is necessary to support a conclusion and identify and apply key strategies to find that evidence.
- 9. Construct and defend arguments in support of or in opposition to particular propositions.
- 10. Analyze and solve complicated strategic challenges in various areas of life.
