The barn is run by Simon and Pliar Rivera
with help from various UC students.

We're both crazy about junk now, 'Simon said.
Buyers at the barn include various goods dealers, other university departments and the general
public, who recycle back into use the deposed articles, usually at great savings.

And saving cash is a top priority for schools in
a state facing a \$35 billion budget deficit. (Or is it
a \$26 billion deficit? Talk about economic uncertainty.)

The budget thing is really starting to hit
departments, 'Simon said, noting that, while
hulking pea-green filing cabinets aren't the most
sightly, they cost \$\$0 at the Bargain Barn rather
than \$300 new.

The delight of Simon's workplace lies not only
in the potential cost-saving it provides, but in the
sheer oddness of the items for sale. A university
with nearly 30,000 students, after all, acquires
